

MAIA Board Members

MAIA is registered as a 501c3 nonprofit organization in the United States and is legally registered as Asociación MAIA in Guatemala. All MAIA board members have renewable three-year terms for another three years. Each board member is also a member of at least one of the following committees: Executive, Finance, Fundraising, or Local (Guatemala) Support.

PRESIDENT: Bill Ernstrom (Golden, CO)

Xochitl Oseguera (Oakland, CA)

As Senior Vice President of MomsRising and its Spanish-language arm, MamásConPoder, Xochitl Oseguera directs one of the nation's most successful programs to educate and mobilize Latina moms, both online and on the ground. She has more than 25 years experience working with, reaching out to, and educating Latinx people in the USA. Oseguera spearheads all of MomsRising's Spanish-language initiatives, managing and overseeing a team of staff and organizers who help shape public policy and register members of the Latinx community to vote. A leading national strategist and spokesperson on a range of issues, including economic justice, women's and children's health, immigration, criminal justice reform, gun safety, and others. She is frequently covered by top Spanish- and English-language media outlets and called on to confer with state and federal lawmakers. She is a mother of two and lives in California. Concepción Petzey (Sololá, Guatemala)

Concepción Petzey Sosof, a 28-year-old Maya Tzutujil woman from Santiago Atitlán, now residing in Sololá, is the only member of her family to achieve a university degree. Currently, she is the Treasury Manager at Cooperativa Integral de Ahorro y Crédito Soluciones. Concepción is a public accountant and has completed a master's in International Accounting and Auditing Standards with an Emphasis on Fiscal and Business Compliance. She is an active leader in community and political movements. During MAIA's Legacy Starfish Program, she was a distinguished, perseverant, resilient Girl Pioneer. Concepción's story is a testament to achieving MAIA's 4 organizational goals. Concepción serves as the vice president of the board of directors of Asociación MAIA, the legally registered entity in Guatemala.

Angel del Valle (Guatemala City, Guatemala)

Ángel del Valle is a social anthropologist with 12 years of experience in research, project implementation, and monitoring and evaluation in thematic areas, including adolescent empowerment, education, child marriage, agency, social norms, gender-based violence, youth engagement, and policy advocacy to improve social protection frameworks. He has led experimental and mixed-method evaluations of programs designed to empower adolescent girls in marginalized settings, including rural and indigenous populations. Ángel has promoted the expansion of programs focused on adolescent girls in Belize, Guatemala, Mexico, the Dominican Republic, Honduras, and El Salvador and has supported efforts to reach Native American girls in the United States. He has also served as an advisor to national governments and multilateral institutions, promoting evidence-based policy design to meet the needs of the most marginalized populations. Additionally, he has advised donors and foundations on grant-making strategies focusing on education and girls. Ángel serves as the Country Representative for the Guatemala Office of the Population Council. He has advised MAIA for five years in program impact measurement.
